



UPC Joy Sharing for August







PADS Lake County has provided emergency shelter sites for those experiencing a housing crisis in Lake County since Christmas Eve, 1987. Our UPC PADS Site, a partnership between United Protestant Church and St. Gilbert Catholic Church, has been a part of this Emergency Shelter Program since 1991. Sites offer the hospitality of 3 meals, toiletries, and some clothing in addition to a safe and warm place to sleep from October through April. Covid regulations caused all church sites to close. When safety regulations allowed reopening, many sites were unable to do so because of the lack of volunteers. Some church sites, such as our UPC PADS Site, have become support churches for larger churches that couldn't open without the extra volunteers. **Volunteers and church sites are needed.** Read more about this in the PADS UPDATE found in this August *UNIFIER*.

Since 1987, PADS Lake County has expanded its program of Public Action to Deliver Shelter to include 5 different programs and has changed the acronym **PADS** to stand for **Providing Advocacy, Dignity & Shelter**. All of these programs have continued to offer assistance to those experiencing a housing crisis in spite of Covid and the numerous related restrictions.

The **Emergency Shelter Program** shifted completely, and now in part, to placing clients in hotels and providing food and other necessities to them in those locations. Church sites are open; more sites and volunteers are needed.

Other programs include the **Day Resource Center**—the point of entry for those experiencing homelessness; **Outreach**—seeks to find and engage people experiencing homelessness out in the community: sleeping in cars, parks, tents, etc.; **Prevention & Diversion**—provides earlier intervention to those at risk of homelessness, seeking to stop them from falling into it; and **Supportive Housing**—for individuals facing longer-term homelessness as a result of physical or mental disability and follows the "Housing First" model which is designed to get people into housing and out of homeless as quickly and appropriately as possible. 

An OCC story by Shanika & Sherika:

We grew up in rural Jamaica sharing most things, not because we're twins, but because it was a necessity for our family to make ends meet. Our parents had us in their late teens. They couldn't afford an ultrasound, so having twins was unexpected. Our mom and dad had to stop attending college in order to provide for us. They worked hard — our mom at home and our dad in sugar cane fields. Both Christians, our parents had faith that the Lord Jesus would provide for our needs. Every morning, they gathered us together for devotions.

To enable both of us to have something to write on at school, our father cut an 8" x 9" notebook in half. He also broke a pencil in two and sharpened the lead with a knife because we didn't have a pencil sharpener. We wished we could have full-sized notebooks and pencils like some of our peers. Our wish came true at age 8 when we heard shriek after shriek of delight in the halls of our school.

Large cardboard boxes with a shoebox plane printed on them were delivered to each classroom. We were so excited about these huge brown boxes and were curious to see what was inside. We rejoiced when we learned that they contained shoebox gifts for us. One of us received two full-sized notebooks! We shared what was in our shoeboxes so we could each have one. We also received our first calculator—a small gray one we still love to use.

We received a pair of woolen mittens. We didn't need them for warmth, but we put them to good use as pot holders. Our parents still have them at home in Jamaica. We also received pencils and pencil sharpeners, as well as crayons, coloring books, and personal care items.

At first, we wondered who we knew that would send us these gifts. We had learned the story of the Good Samaritan in Sunday School. So when we saw Samaritan's Purse printed on the tape that held the shoebox closed, we knew that Good Samaritan had sent us these gifts.

Through the shoebox gifts, we learned that you don't have to be close neighbors in order to help each other. These gifts came from strangers. The boxes of gifts ultimately reflected the goodness of Christ, showing us that the Lord graciously provides for us. We felt God's love for us as we received them.

UPC will be packing shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child in November. Please help us collect the items we need to fill each box so that other children may come to know God's love through these simple gifts.

UPC PADS SITE WILL NOT OPEN FOR 2023-2024 SEASON:

Neither our UPC PADS Site nor St. Mary of Vernon will be able to recruit enough volunteers individually to open this coming PADS Emergency Shelter Season. Therefore, UPC PADS volunteers will be volunteering at St. Mary of Vernon Catholic Church in Indian Creek, Wildwood Presbyterian Church in Gages Lake, and at Shepherd of the Lakes Lutheran Church in Grayslake in order to help these sites remain open to welcome guests for the 2023-2024 Emergency Shelter Season. Our UPC PADS kitchen crew will once again provide a monthly dinner meal for guests who are taken to St. Mary of Vernon. Most volunteers will be returning to the shifts they worked onsite on Thursday nights at St. Mary's, but some will be volunteering closer to home at either Shepherd of the Lakes on Monday nights, or at Wildwood Presbyterian on Tuesday nights. Donations made to UPC PADS will continue to be used to meet the PADS guests' and clients' needs, whether they are going to one of these sites, are in a hotel room, or receive what they need at the Day Resource Center because they are going to one of the other sites that will be open.

We don't currently have the answer to this question. Rose Pech and Rick Burg will be sharing information with the UPC Mission Committee in October. They will be discussing how UPC can best serve PADS, hopefully, in continued partnership and cooperation with St. Gilbert Catholic Church. The Mission Committee members then have the responsibility of deciding what this might look like as we move forward. Watch for more information later this winter or in spring and early summer when the decision must be made for the 2024-2025 Emergency Shelter Season and beyond.
