And Who is My Neighbor?

Most of us remember the basic story line of the parable that Jesus tells that has come to be known as the parable of the good Samaritan. What perhaps we are a bit foggier on is the question that led to Jesus telling the story. Often Jesus tells a parable as a way of communicating a point. In this case though, the parable is in response to a question Jesus received. An expert in the law wanted to justify his living. Jesus tells the parable in response to his question, “And who is my neighbor?”

This is a question that we can ask ourselves in self-reflection rather than to justify ourselves. Because we know that the call of Jesus for us is to love our neighbors as ourselves then how do we do so? Who is our neighbor? How do we live our lives in such a way that we are not self-centered or selfish, but that we reach out to the people around us?

As a congregation I would like us to ask this question of ourselves with intentionality in 2020. You might say this will be our question for the year: “And who is my neighbor?” I believe this question will help us focus not just on the work and mission inside UPC, but also help us to expand and to think about how we are neighbors to those around us. How are we living as ambassadors of Christ in the places we work? In the neighborhoods in which we reside? If we can think about who our neighbors are, then we will lay a good foundation for us to think about how we can reach them with the good news of the Gospel.

Dear Church Family,

In the development of a disciple, there is a moment in which we move from being merely convinced of Jesus to being confident in who He is, what He has done, and who we have become in Him. Confidence is one characteristic that defined Peter's life. He confidently declares Christ to be the Messiah. We see him step out of a boat and walk toward Jesus without a moment's hesitation. On the eve of Christ's death, Peter confidently states that he would never leave Christ's side and fall away. Peter's life is defined by moments of confidence. We are going to look at one of these moments, when he seemingly moves from being convinced of Andrew's assessment of who Jesus is (Luke 5) and states with confidence who Jesus is himself.

When Andrew, Peter's brother, first met Jesus, he came to Peter and said, "We have found the Messiah." (John 1:41) Those five words set Peter off on a journey to learn for himself who this Jesus is. Through listening to Jesus' teachings and witnessing Jesus' miracles, Peter became convinced the Andrew was correct in his assessment, and he answers Jesus' call to follow and be a fisher of man. Just as that question shifted the trajectory of Peter's life, Jesus will ask a question that continues Peter's journey of faith.

Each of the four Gospels record this question, Jesus first asks his disciples, "Who do the people say that I am?" The disciples answer that the people see Jesus, in general, as a prophet. Some say a specific prophet, John the Baptist, Jeremiah, or Elijah. Some see Him as a generic prophet, maybe one from history, or a new one in the mold of one who had come before. Jesus then shifts the focus to His disciples asking, "Who do you say that I am?". His disciples have given up everything and are following Him. They have heard all His teaching and seen all His miracles. Peter speaks for the twelve answering, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." (Matthew 16:16) As the disciples have walked with Jesus and been with Him, they have become convinced of who He is.

Peter's confession on behalf of the disciples is significant, because it demonstrates the work that is being done by God in their hearts and minds. In Matthew 16:24, Jesus says to Peter, "You are blessed, Simon son of Jonah, because flesh and blood did not reveal this to you, but my Father in heaven!" One of the things we have talked about in the *Reimagining Evangelism* class on Sunday mornings is that only God can change hearts. God is the one who possesses life-changing power. Peter and the other disciples faithfully followed, listened, watched, and were with Jesus throughout His earthly ministry, but it was only by the power of God at work in their hearts that they were able to see Jesus for who He truly is.

What has God used in your life to bring you to the point of being confident of who He is? Maybe you still have some questions about how you would answer Jesus' question. That is okay, too. The way of a disciple is a journey. Jesus shows us the way, and as the author of Hebrews states, is the pathfinder or pioneer of our faith. God is at work both in the hearts of His people and in the world. Like the disciples, we are to be faithful in following, and God is the one who changes our hearts and the hearts of those around us. If you have a story of God's transform-
