Dear Church Family,

Whenever I reflect on the education ministries at UPC, I am so thankful for all our volunteers. We could not run our ministries effectively without your amazing help and willingness to serve.

As I look forward to this upcoming year, we need a few more volunteers for our Adult and Children's Ministry. To run these programs most effectively, our church needs one or two more people willing to teach in our Children's Ministry and more people who would be willing to be a Sunday School helper. Often, this means you would commit to leading a children's class once per month, though you could certainly assist more if you'd like!

People who volunteer to lead children's Sunday school are provided with the lesson plan and materials and supplies needed about a month in advance. They are also given flexibility to adjust and tailor the lesson to their needs, and I am a resource to help support wherever needed. The curriculum UPC uses is designed to be user-friendly and connect well with the kids.

I am also looking to expand the variety of teachers for our Adult Education classes. These classes typically vary from topical discussions to exploring books of the Bible. I would love to provide opportunities for a variety of people to serve in our various educational ministries, so that the people of our church can utilize their giftings as well as we can be taught by a variety of voices.

PADS LAKE COUNTY:

LAKE COUNTY'S 1ST FIXED FAMILY SHELTER SITE ZONING APPROVED!
Waukegan's City Council unanimously approved the conditional zoning for PADS to use



the current Travelodge at North Lewis Avenue as a fixed shelter site for families who are being served by PADS Lake County. PADS hopes to complete renovations and have the site open by this coming spring or early next summer. Both DuPage County PADS and the city of Evanston have fixed sites which have been successfully operating for some time. We are thrilled to join them in moving forward for those experiencing

homelessness. The future for help depends on fixed sites and affordable housing, as well as other systematic changes.

• Gurnee: FairBridge Inn Express, 3740 Grand Avenue, is the proposed site for a fixed shelter for individuals. Meetings continue to be held with hopes that this property will become the next fixed shelter site. If zoning is approved, PADS Lake County will begin renovating it and hope to open it sometime next year. Pray that zoning is approved and that it will be an asset for people who are homeless and for people who have businesses and/or homes in the area.



- Current client numbers: At last report, approximately 520 people who are experiencing a housing crisis were housed in motels in Lake County.
- Current Needs: In addition to regular food supplies for clients in hotels, sack lunches are
 a continuing need for people who come to 1800 Grand Avenue to seek help from PADS.
 Lunches can be delivered to PADS at 1800 Grand Avenue during any weekday. Sign up
 on their online signup genius for an open date, or call 847-689-4357 to let them know you
 would like to deliver lunches to the office.

JOIN PADS FOR A CELEBRATION: On Saturday, September 28 at 7 p.m., PADS will host its 2024 Path to Progress Celebration, dubbed "A Night at the Speakeasy Casino," at Hawthorn Mall in Vernon Hills. 
