Grace to you and Peace,

On July 4<sup>th</sup>, our country will celebrate the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of The Declaration of Independence. That document would declare the separation and independence of the thirteen American colonies from under British rule and the thumb of King George III. In recent years, there has been much discussion with no small amount of controversy about what it might look like to include the earlier histories of this land, including but not limited to the native people who have been here since time immemorial. In fact, the European-Christian history itself begins much earlier than that 250 year date would imply. As early as 1570, Spanish missionaries were preaching the gospel, and likely holding prayer services, in Florida and the Southeast. In specific regard to United Protestant's predominantly English heritage, we have even more precise history. Robert Hunt, an Anglican chaplain in Jamestown is reported to have preached and led worship on May 13, 1607, the very day the Jamestown Colony was founded.

The earliest purported protestant sermon is a manuscript that is dated December 1621 and preached on by Robert Cushman at the Plymouth Colony, titled "Sin and the Danger of Self-Love"\*. Ten years later, John Winthrop preached the most famous of Pilgrim Sermons: a "Dream of City on a Hill"\*\*. Though this sermon is regarded as an essential classic of the English settler, it ironically may not have been preached on this continent. Rather, it is likely to have been preached on English soil, just prior to boarding The Arbella for America. Winthrop's sermon addressed his fellow pilgrims who would later arrive in Salem, Massachusetts, where they would found the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

I commend these sermons to you this 4<sup>th</sup> of July, because they offer a glimpse at the pious dreams and intentions of the same English settlers that would eventually declare their independence a century later. I found that reading these sermons in this way did not disappoint. In fact, though delivered by different men in different places, the content and concerns of these sermons did not differ greatly.

Cushman's 1621 sermon examines the struggles of the church in Corinth before expounding to key points to his fellow settlers: "The Dehortation, Let no man seek his own. The Exhortation, But every man another's wealth."

The entirety of the message urged each member of the community to concern themselves first and foremost with the welfare and flourishing of their neighbors. At length, Cushman stresses that it is natural to humanity to worry first and foremost about one's needs and the needs of one's own household. His primary reasoning for this is because the witness and wisdom of Jesus and the entirety of the scriptures calls us to live this way. However, as he digs deeper, he turns to the Old Testament Book of Nehemiah. Here he stressed that there is no way, *no way whatsoever, that a city or a nation can stand or flourish if its citizens live solely out of selfish ambition. If the colony at Plymouth wishes to flourish, the only path forward will be to consider above all else the good of the neighbors and the many.*

John Winthrop opens his address by describing the estate of humanity as being created to belong to the rest of the creation, intended to be a vessel and witness to the grace of God, and to be in relationship with each other. He then also turns to Nehemiah stressing that the nature and future of the settlers and the life exists in covenant before God. Here Winthrop again stresses the need to prioritize the needs of the other over the self if the colony is going to service; going so far as to specifically invoke the jubilee commission to consider forgiving each other's financial debts in order to strengthen the colony as a whole!

Then turning to Micah, he asserts that "the only way to avoid this shipwreck, and to provide for our posterity, is to follow the counsel of Micah, to do justly, to love mercy, to walk humbly with our God." This famous passage he asserts must path a gracious and loving way to share their life together in worship and community, but also in commerce, business, and all formal affairs.

As our nation celebrates this 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary, I invite you to take these words seriously. There is no doubt that we are living in entirely different times than those pilgrims. There is also no doubt that their story along with the story of their descendants, this land and the country they would eventually found, is a complicated and uneven history. I commend you to prayerfully consider the legacy of these settlers and their historical inheritance this week.

Where have we seen these values upheld, and where have we failed?

Where do we see unconditional Christian fellowship and love of our neighbor in our culture today?

Where do we see our culture falling into self service, greed, and even hatred of neighbor?

Happy 4<sup>th</sup> of July, and I leave you with John Winthrop's closing words:

And to shut this discourse with that exhortation of Moses, that faithful servant of the Lord, in his last farewell to Israel, Deut. 30. "Beloved, there is now set before us life and death, good and evil," in that we are commanded this day to love the Lord our God, and to love one another, to walk in his ways and to keep his Commandments and his ordinance and his laws, and the articles of our Covenant with Him, that we may live and be multiplied, and that the Lord our God may bless us in the land whither we go to possess it. *But if our hearts shall turn away, so that we will not obey, but shall be seduced, and worship other Gods, our pleasure and profits, and serve them; it is propounded unto us this day, we shall surely perish out of the good land whither we pass over this vast sea to possess it.*

*Therefore let us choose life,  
that we and our seed may live,  
by obeying His voice and cleaving to Him,  
for He is our life and our prosperity.*

## UPC YOUTH GROUP NEWS

Almost a year has passed since members held our meeting to choose regular activities and events in which we'd like to participate on a monthly schedule. The final list included the top ten activities suggested for entertainment and the four service projects for which the UPC Mission Team had invited us to help. Members have enjoyed six of the top ten "fun" activities so far, plus a game time and celebration for Greyson Madden's Confirmation Day. Since the July 22 planning meeting, youth have participated in all four of the mission projects and have done three additional mission activities. One of our favorites is FMSC, where some of us are scheduling sessions with our family members and other friends, in addition to the sessions we've done with the UPC Youth Group. More youth group sessions are being planned for July, August, and into the fall.

Additionally, some of us helped sort UPC PADS supplies in preparation for possible use at the new PADS family site. The group disposed of unusable pillows, bagged pillows for the new site, recycled linens, and set aside two huge bags of sheets which were taken by Dan and Julie Burdett for use at Save-A-Pet. Remaining items which can be used at the family site or for clients in other PADS programs will be picked up by PADS later this summer. What's left that's good enough will be donated to help veterans who are moving into housing, and the remainder given to Save-a-Pet.

More is to come: Ann Friesema and Stephanie Perdew are contacting the Chicago Temple UMC in hopes of scheduling a Sunday morning worship at this First Methodist Church skyscraper, followed by a tour of the building. Andrew Friesema and other adult facilitators will be contacting youth to schedule more FMSC sessions and possibly other activities. As soon as Rose Pech receives our ideas for future activities, we'll once again be voting for our preferences and setting up another year of fellowship and service for anyone who's in junior high or high school.
