Grace to you and Peace,

"Now about eight days after (this) Jesus took with him Peter and John and James and went up on the mountain to pray. While Jesus was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. Suddenly (Peter, James and John) saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking about his **exodus**, which he was about to fulfill in Jerusalem."

-Luke 9:28-32

This Sunday, March 3 is known as Transfiguration Sunday. Transfiguration Sunday is the last Sunday of the Season after Epiphany, but it is also the Sunday we read the story of Jesus' transfiguration before the disciples. Luke's account, which we will read this year, does a masterful job of telling the story in a way that both draws us close to this season of making complicated things clear, and also pointing us towards the Season of Lent. While Jesus is praying, something remarkable happens and the disciples can see the difference. The problem is that they do not understand it, at all. They are told that Jesus is going to Jerusalem to fulfill his mission, and it is clear that they do not yet have a clue what that will be. They want a "mountain top" (spiritual) experience. However, Luke's use of the Greek word for *exodus* points us to a more important aspect of our journey to God: namely that it is in the witness of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross that we see the depths and heights of what God is calling us to.

Ash Wednesday always follows Transfiguration Sunday. This Wednesday March 5, we will commence our Lenten journey at two distinct times. The sanctuary will be open at 7 a.m. for the imposition of ashes and prayer. At 7 p.m. we will be gathering for a Lenten worship service and the imposition of ashes. The current practice of "forty days" of fasting heading up to Easter dates to at least the fourth century Nicene Council. At that time the 40 days of Lenten fasting are connected as preparation for the feast of Easter and at that time became a common practice throughout Christendom. However, before Nicaea it seems that there was no fast before Easter. Rather, among many communities there was an earlier fast of three weeks in preparation for baptism. This three-week period may draw an even earlier pre-Christian origin in a three-week long Jewish fast in preparation for Passover. I want to propose that there is a profound connection between preparing for Passover and preparing for Holy Week that should inform our understanding of Lent. Let me explain.

The Passover is the Jewish feast remembering the liberation of Israel from slavery. The liberation, however, was not yet entirely fulfilled by the Israelites crossing over the Red Sea. Rather, the Israelites wandered in the desert for **40 years** (!) before they were finally allowed to enter the promised land. In the Rabbinic teaching it is commonly taught that what happened here was an essential part of the liberation of the people; namely the generation that had been formed to be slaves needed to pass away in order for the next generation to be prepared to receive their freedom. Our 40 days of Lenten fasting should do the same for us. Lent is the most serious and austere season of the year; the fasting and austerity are not the ultimate end of Lent any more than escaping Egypt represented the complete exodus of God.

The Lenten season is meant to serve as a container for a time of extended, focused, and intentional prayer. These forty days are a spiritual journey meant to set our faces on the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ. However, if the exodus is to be the ground of this action, we must learn to see the death and resurrection of Christ as something far better and more profound than an act of divine punishment enacted on God's own son. We are on a journey of repentance and fasting for sure. However this is a spiritual journey that depends on Grace. Lent is about turning towards Christ, and expecting patiently to receive even more freedom! The Apostle Paul brings all of this together in his famous passage from Romans 6:

"We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.

Therefore, do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace."

-Romans 6:9-14

However you practice this fast season, let it be a journey through the cross to something even greater here and now. The freedom we are receiving from Christ is about more than an eternal destination. Like Moses, the resurrected Christ is calling us to turn towards a freedom here. Christ promises a new life of faith, hope, and love now. We are not just trying to be good people, Jesus leading us to live our lives to the full (John 10:10), and promises us a share in overcoming the world (John 16:33).

Lent is a hard and serious spiritual season. It is one worth suffering through well; however, if we believe the many promises of The Word, there is so much more that we stand to achieve by the grace and Mystery of God.

Just in case all that theory is too much, permit me to leave with the words of U2's lead singer, who often has a gift to summarize theology into accessible words:

High, higher than the sun You shoot me from a gun I need you to elevate me here At the corner of your lips As the orbit of your hips Eclipse, you elevate my soul

I've got no self-control
Been living like a mole
Now going down, excavation
I and I in the sky
You make me feel like I can fly
So high, elevation



Dear Church Family,

How did we get through the month of February so quickly? With February coming to an end, Lent is soon upon us, with Ash Wednesday on March 5. I hope that you will join us for our Ash Wednesday service and each Sunday as we prepare ourselves for Easter. I am excited about our Lenten study. We will be reading through the book *Lent: The Season of Repentance and Renewal*, by Esau McCaulley. I really appreciate Esau's voice and his writing on Lent in this book providing us with a reflection upon the season and encouraging us to spiritual formation becoming more like Christ. I want to share with you briefly the description from the back cover of the book.

"Lent is inescapably about repenting.

Every year, the church invites us into a season of repentance and fasting in preparation for Holy Week. It's an invitation to turn away from our sins and toward the mercy and grace of Christ.

Often, though, we experience the Lenten fast as either a mindless ritual or self-improvement program. In this short volume, priest and scholar Esau McCaulley introduces the season of Lent, showing us how its prayers and rituals point us not just to our own sinfulness but also beyond to our merciful Savior.

Each volume in the Fullness of Time series invites readers to engage with the riches of the church year, exploring how its traditions, prayers, Scriptures, and rituals all lead us to Jesus."

As we begin to enter into the Lenten Season, I encourage you to find a spiritual practice to do throughout the season. Find ways to seek Jesus as we prepare to celebrate His grace and mercy. I hope that you will join us on Sunday mornings throughout Lent as we seek to do this together in faithful community.

As noted in a February Tuesday Newsday, PADS has been working with an engineering firm and has hired a general contractor who will be hiring subcontractors to do the work required for the fixed family shelter site to be ready for occupancy this fall.

PADS Clients receive more donations from UPC:

Repair the Harm Update:

The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) filed for bankruptcy relief in 2020, overwhelmed by lawsuits of child sexual abuse related to the program as far back as the 1960s. The United Methodist Church (UMC) became involved because of their long-standing relationship with Scouting troops in churches. The UMC committed \$30 million to the Survivor Trust Fund, and the amount allocated to the Northern Illinois Conference (NIC) is \$754,348. To date, the NIC has collected \$547,223 leaving a balance of \$195,205 to raise. Every church within the NIC is encouraged to contribute.
