STEWARDSHIP TESTIMONIAL

Presented during worship on April 30, 2023 by Rose Pech

I'm both honored and humbled to be speaking to you today. I've been blessed in more ways than I can say as a member of United Protestant Church for over 57 years.

The seeds of faith were first planted in my life by my mother and her mother through their teachings and in the way they lived their lives.

Seeds of faith, just like other seeds, need continued nurturing and nutrition to grow. The loving faith community in which I grew up helped the seeds start to grow. However, when I moved to this area and began a very challenging teaching assignment, I drifted away from regular worship, daily Bible reading, and church involvement.

In 1965, after I married Jim Pech and we made our home in Grayslake, I realized something was missing -- I needed to be closer to God. I wanted to find a church like the one I'd known during the earlier years of my life.

I was looking for a Christian church that was a faithful, caring community and included opportunities for growing my faith, for developing a closer personal relationship with God, and for putting my faith into action through service to others. That's what I found and continue to find here at UPC.

Caring people made me feel "at home" and wanted here. Evie Turner and Winnie Manuel showed genuine interest in me as they greeted me when I came to my first worship service. People like Harriet White befriended and mentored me and helped me grow toward becoming a better Christian. Their actions set examples for me to do the same for others.

Our Mission and Ministry opportunities have allowed me to join with fellow Christians and other caring people in service within our church family and through programs such as PADS and Feed My Starving Children.

Our Christian Education programs have helped and continue to help me grow into a closer relationship with God and to be more loving to others.

The Christian Education Program is what I want to focus on today. My first involvement at UPC was in Christian Education and came almost immediately after I joined. I volunteered to be a substitute teacher and soon became the regular sub for the high school Sunday school class. I eventually teamed up with Don Olcott to teach the class.

Students in the mid and late 1960's had challenging questions, requiring Don and me to delve deeply into the scriptures, curriculum, and other resources in our weekly planning sessions to lead meaningful and relevant discussions with the youth on Sundays. Not only did I see the youth growing in their faith, but the seeds of my own faith were sprouting once again.

Through the years, I've participated in all areas of Christian Education at UPC, and each experience has deepened my relationships and love for God and others. Thanks to Carol Roselli-Rasmussen and other Christian Education leaders, adult education classes have provided insights into God's Word and given me the opportunity to read, study, and discuss inspirational materials written by religious leaders such as Richard J. Foster, Francis Chan, and Adam Hamilton among countless others. Retreats have deepened my spiritual life, and classes in specific areas such as prayer, discipleship, and practicing and celebrating Christian disciplines helped me find more ways to become closer with God.

Classes on identifying and finding ways to use my Spiritual Gifts and discernment have helped me zero in on what my true gifts are and how to better use them for service to God and to people.

The Stephen Ministry Program led by Pastor Gary Waters increased my skills in serving people who struggle with various life issues. Having the gift of helping is a place to start but knowing how to listen, when and how to help, and how to set appropriate boundaries are necessary skills to be effective. This program helped me hone these and other skills.

Ryan Aubrey taught a class this past year that included various ways people handle suffering and ways to help them which gave me insights and better understandings. This information helped me improve my personal relationship with one of my sisters who is an amputee and has many struggles related to that and other health issues.

A part of the Children's Ministry program that is currently a real blessing for me involves praying for children and their families and sending notes letting them know they are being prayed for and that it is a joy to have them as part of our church family. I pray for all our members, but it's a privilege to pray and reach out in this special way for specific children and families.

As I say, I've been blessed in so many ways by those who made all this possible in the past, and I continue to be blessed by those of you who are here now, making these blessings possible today. I thank God for all of you and thank you, my UPC family, for helping me grow in my faith and in providing ways for me to put that faith into action!

Soles For Jesus—May Joy Sharing

Soles For Jesus is dedicated to sharing the love of Christ by distributing shoes to the under-served people in sub-Saharan Africa. Since being founded in 2009 by Diane Studer, the organization has developed and expanded in exciting ways! We have a clear mission, an exceptional team and strong partnerships in the U.S. and Africa.

In the fall of 2009, SFJ Founder, Diane Studer, went on her first mission trip to Ethiopia, Africa. On this trip, Diane was standing in the hut of a village pastor, when the Lord gave her a powerful vision of His plan to start an organization called Soles For Jesus. This plan was for people to collect shoes in the U.S., send them across the ocean and distribute them to the under-served, while sharing the life-changing message of Jesus Christ–starting in Ethiopia and spreading throughout Africa.



As soon as Diane returned home, she began sharing her call to start Soles For Jesus with others and received donated warehouse and office

space. This allowed SFJ to be up and running, just weeks after the return of her first trip! A board of directors was formed, and volunteers began serving in the warehouse at S.O.S. events (to Sort & Organize Shoes). Since the start of Soles For Jesus, strong partnerships in Africa have been formed, thousands of shoes have been sent to Africa and thousands of lives have been changed!

These people are not asking for a bicycle, vehicle, bus pass, or some other form of transportation that we are accustomed to in our western world. They simply need a pair of shoes that properly fit them, so they can protect their feet as they walk. What a simple mission! How many containers of shoes do we have in our homes that are unused or outgrown? The mission of SFJ is to gather these shoes and send them to Africa, making a radical difference in the life of a child or adult. By collecting shoes that are hiding in closets and basements across our nation, we can provide hope and diminish disease for *thousands*. The pairs that you donate will be a life-changing treasure across the globe.

BISHOP'S APPEAL FOR MIGRANT NEEDS

As followers of Jesus, we take the commandment to "welcome the Strangers" in our midst seriously. Whether they journeyed from Venezuela on foot, crossed the southern border of the US seeking asylum and ended up on busses to Chicago, or flew across the ocean from Ukraine to escape the Russian invasion, we want to offer compassion, love and care to our neighbors.

Why are people leaving their homes?

- The government is harassing, arresting and even killing people because of their political views or religious affiliation.
- A neighboring country has invaded their nation and their city has started to be bombarded.
- The local gang leaders have threatened their family.
- Storm damage from a recent hurricane has decimated the local economy and they have no way to feed their family.

These are just a few reasons why people leave their homes, sometimes at a moment's notice and often with only a few items that they can carry with them, and flee to other places for safety, security and hope for a better future. Can you imagine? How desperate would you have to be to leave everything that is familiar and make a hazardous journey to an unknown destination in order to protect yourself and your family?

The funds that we raise together through the Bishop's Appeal will go to organizations providing immediate needs like hygiene kits, temporary shelter and food; and longer-term needs like employment, housing, medical care, and legal assistance. We will partner with groups such as <u>Justice for Our Neighbors</u>, <u>World Relief</u>, <u>Refugee One</u>, <u>Illinois Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights</u> (ICIRR), and local Northern Illinois Conference Churches.

We can't fix all the world situations that cause migrations, but we can be a source of hope and life for our neighbors who are on our doorstep. Start planning for what your Church can give to the Bishop's Appeal for Migrant Needs at Annual Conference.

Experience what it's like to sleep at a rotating PADS shelter site as we spend the night in our UPC PADS Shelter (Fellowship Hall and adjacent hallway) for PADS Lake County 2023 SleepOut for Shelter and raise funds for those less fortunate. Eat dinner at home & come to UPC at 6 PM on Saturday & stay until 7AM on Sunday.
 - a. Children in 5th grade & under must be accompanied by parents or responsible adult approved by parents.
 - b. Ratio of adults to youth 6th grade through high school must be 1 adult:3 youth. (Youth/parents can check with Rose Pech to see if we have enough adults.)
 - c. Eat dinner before coming to the site at 6 PM on Saturday, May 20.
 - d. Bring clothing, other necessities, treats, & games in ONE large bag.
 - e. Line up outside Fellowship Hall entrance for pad assignment.
 - f. Put belongings onto chair next to your pad, make your pad, & visit with others.

 - j. At 10:30 (or sooner) retire to your pad with all electronics & lights off.
 - k. Morning wakeup & cleanup will be followed by a continental-type breakfast.
 - I. Close with a brief service of thank-you & prayer before site closes at 7 AM.
