Grace to you and peace from God our Father and from Jesus Christ, AMEN.

This coming Sunday, May 4, United Protestant Church will celebrate with Joseph Friesma, Timothy Knapp, and Evan Kutsin as they confirm their baptism. At infant baptism, it is the family, godparents and church who gather to create a covenant around the gift of new life; namely to raise that child in the faith and to raise them in the faith. Confirmation, as we practice it today, is an initiation to the young people to publicly recognize that reality with their faith community and to enter fully by choice into that covenant with the community of faith.

For over 75 years, United Protestant Church has been bringing babies, children, and adults into the church through baptism and confirmation! While Christians are not in unified agreement about the appropriate age of baptism, we are in agreement that baptism is the sacrament through which one becomes a member of the earthly church, but even more so, by dying and rising with Christ, is formally adopted as a child of God and enters into the church universal and eternal. In this way, baptism is a foundational practice for the institution that we call "The Christian Church."

Confirmation also represents a certain transition, from the development of faith into adult faith. However, the truth is we all need a faithful church across the entire life cycle to sustain our faith and keep us growing. The Catholic church often refers to the church as the "mother of faith." This image is meant to conjure the primary and personal way that the church nurtures Christian faith into life and health. Confirmation is a day for everyone as it is also a day we celebrate the church as the mother of our faith. It is also thus particularly fitting that the Sunday following confirmation, **Sunday, May 11** is Mother's Day; the day when we celebrate and recognize literally our mothers as a culture.

When we call the church the mother of faith, it is also reference to all the many ministries which form, nurture, and ultimately carry persons in the faith. Just as many mothers sing to their children to sooth and comfort them, so the church sings and creates music in order to strengthen faith. We will complete our trifecta of special Sundays in May on **May 18** when we celebrate UPC Music Sunday together. I do hope you will join us that day, as we not only celebrate Kurt Mockenhaupt and all of our members who minister to us through the gift of music, but also take a moment to give thanks for 75+ years of making music together as a church!

May is a busy month, full of wonderful things! I look forward to sharing it with all of you!

We are collecting the following items for Operation Christmas Child throughout the month of May: toothbrushes, wash cloths, paddle balls, and dolls.

COMPANIONS JOURNEYING TOGETHER

Hundreds of Christmas cards without personal messages have been donated, but Christmas cards with handwritten messages inside mean so much more to the people who receive them, especially if these people can't be with their families! Have you written messages in our Christmas cards for inmates to whom we reach out?



In 2023, we sent 131 cards with messages. In 2024, the number jumped to 216. **So far in 2025**, we have received 40 cards with messages to send for distribution to Illinois inmates from UPC members and friends! Our goal for 2025 is to send at least 300! It's not realistic to expect 2 people to do 150 cards each or 3 people to do 100, but **WE CAN DO THIS** in one of several other ways: 30 people could write messages in just 10 cards, 25 people could do 12 cards each, 20 people -15 cards, 15 people - 20 cards, 12 people - 25 cards, 10 people - 30 cards. Could you be in one of these groups and make sure we reach our goal? Packs of 10 cards each along with a sheet of message ideas are on the Mission Table, and more can be set out as those are taken. Take a pack this month for yourself to write in or ask someone you know to write the messages. Be a part of making this mission "Thrive in 2025!" Put each completed card into a blank unsealed envelope. Put finished cards into the plastic container on the Mission Table or on the desk in the office. Thanks for being part of making this happen!

JOY SHARING FOR MAY

Malaria is one of the world's most common and serious tropical diseases, with about half the world's population at risk of being infected with malaria. Although preventable and treatable, malaria causes significant morbidity and mortality, with the greatest numbers of cases and deaths in resource-poor regions and among young children.



- Globally in 2022, there were an estimated 249 million malaria cases and 608,000 malaria deaths in 85 countries.
- The WHO African Region carries a disproportionately high share of the global malaria burden. In 2022, Africa was home to 94% of malaria cases (233 million) and 95% (580,000) of malaria deaths.
- Children under 5 accounted for about 80% of all malaria deaths in Africa.

There is a connection between climate change and malaria. Changes in temperature, humidity and rainfall can influence the behavior and survival of the malaria-carrying Anopheles mosquito. Extreme weather events, such as heatwaves and flooding, can also directly impact transmission and disease burden. Catastrophic flooding in Pakistan in 2022, for example, led to a five-fold increase in malaria cases in that country.

In addition to extreme weather events, other drivers of malaria epidemics and spikes in malaria cases include humanitarian crises, biological threats, such as drug and insecticide resistance, and socioeconomic constraints.

There are, however, grounds for optimism. Successes include, among others: the roll-out of the world's first malaria vaccine and the recommendation by WHO of a second safe and effective vaccine; the current availability of a new generation of dual-active ingredient insecticide-treated nets; the scale-up of seasonal malaria prevention for children at high risk of severe malaria; and progress towards or the achievement of malaria elimination in a widening circle of countries. By donating to Malaria No More, you can help work towards the day when malaria is eliminated in other countries as it was in the US in 1951. In 1900, malaria was present in approximately 53% of the world. In 2022, that number had shrunk to 27%. World-wide elimination is possible. However, progress is threatened because of proposed funding cuts. It is estimated the cuts could lead to an additional 18 million new cases and 166,000 new deaths a year. Won't you please help? Joy Sharing Sunday is May 18.

LAKE COUNTY HAVEN

We collected a Joy Sharing offering in January for The Lake County Haven, but there are other ways to support them all year long. One way is by providing breakfasts, lunches, and dinners. The Haven has two houses in Libertyville, each with 10 residents. The Mission Committee has been providing dinner every other month, switching houses each month. There are three ways to do this: provide homemade dinners, purchase ready-made dinners from restaurants, or buy groceries to make their meal. You can help too! The Haven helps homeless women and children achieve permanent, independent living.
