Dear Church Family,

The past month has been strange to say the least. The uncertainty of these times often brings people to questioning the realities around them. Christ followers as well as non-Christ followers question things they have thought or were taught as children regarding the spiritual realm. Questions of God's goodness, of the reality of death and what it means to die, and questions regarding the purpose or seemingly purposelessness of life are all brought to the forefront of people's minds during times such as these. How is it that we are to respond? How do we begin to grapple with these sorts of issues?

Thankfully, we are not left to our own devices in the search for answers. God in His mercy has provided numerous resources for us as we seek truth. First, God has provided us with His Word. God speaks to us in our daily life. He speaks to us in our struggles. When we consistently remain in God's Word, we come to a greater understanding of ourselves, the nature of the created world around us, and of God Himself. Three basic questions can be asked as we read and talk with others about Scripture: "What does this teach us about God?" (who He is and how He acts), "What does this teach us about ourselves?" (who we are, what our natural nature is, and the inclinations of our heart), and "How do those things shape how I should respond/live?". Remember, though the study of God's Word is best done in community, not merely individually trying to decipher God's secret message for us. It is to be done in communication with our community of faith (our church body, both local and global), with those who have gone before, and in partnership with the Holy Spirit (through constant prayer).

God not only provides His Word for us as we continue to seek Him and His purposes, but He also provides us with the record of the saints who have gone before us. Ecclesiastes states that, "There is nothing new under the sun." This is indeed true. The suffering we undergo are the same as those before us have faced. The questions that we ask regarding how things are or how they aught to be have been asked before. Numerous books have been written by those who have gone before us in this race: St. Augustine, Thomas A Kempis, Boethius, CS Lewis, Ruth Paxson, Watchman Nee, and many more. Faithful believers have asked the same questions we have at this time and struggled through what God's Word says. These are not replacements for Scripture but are to be used alongside of Scripture.

Finally, it is important to remember that often we are not able to give a proper explanation to why things are happening or why certain things are not happening. One of the great aspects of the book of Job is that we as the reader know the heavenly dealings that lead to and shape the events of the rest of the book. Job is clueless to the spiritual realities and spiritual battle that is going on through all the brokenness and suffering in his life. He is not able to ascribe a specific purpose to his struggles, despite his friends' best efforts. Like Job, we often are left grasping for straws about the circumstances all around us. We as humans, especially post-enlightenment people, desire explanations for things. We want to be able to put events, circumstances, and struggles boxes. We desire to analyze them with the hope of understanding the "hows and whys" of our lives. The reality though, is that there are some events, circumstances, times of brokenness that we will never be able to answer rationally or scientifically. This is where two things come in to play: Faith in the character of God and at times lamentation over the condition of the world. If you have the time, theologian N.T. Wright wrote an excellent piece for <u>TIME</u> on not having answers during this time. I encourage you to read it if you get the chance.

The questions and issues of our times are difficult and important. I pray that we will continue to seek God in these times. Relying upon God's promises and what we know to be true of His character. Stay rooted in God's Word. Remain in communion with those who have gone before. Continue to have faith conversations with those in your families, in your church, and in your neighborhood. CONTINUING TO MEET PLADS CLIENTS' NEEDS: Since April 8, all PADS Lake County clients have been in hotel rooms. This was the best way to limit any potential exposure. Thank you to everyone who filled a shift or provided food while guests were at the Warren Township Senior Center.

PADS is still filling boxes with food for the clients in the hotels. If you are able to help with donations for that, the donations can be dropped off at PADS, 1800 Grand Avenue in Waukegan, Monday-Friday, between 8am and 4pm. You will not need to enter the building. Staff members can "grab and go". Just pull up and ring the bell. Again, PADS is trying to maintain the safe distance of 6 feet away. Some of the items needed for hotel stays are those that are pop top cans and microwavable items. These are some suggestions for donations:

- Dinty Moore meals, Progresso or Chunky Chicken Noodle soups, Ravioli, Spaghetti and Meatballs, Ramon cups, shelf microwavable meals (beef stew, etc.) Cans must have pop tops!
- Loaves of bread
- Beef Jerky, Slim Jim, Meat Sticks, Spam Packets, Tuna Packets, Chicken packets
- Breakfast Cereal bars or granola bars, small boxes of cereal, Pop Tarts
- Fruit cups or Pudding cups
- \$10 gift cards to McDonald's with Note "Attention Nicole"
