Dear Church Family,

I would like to thank you all for a good start to our ministry year. I have been very pleased with our participation in our faith growth opportunities so far.

In our Children's Ministry, the kids talked about creation over the past few weeks. We began and ended the month-long focus on creation with an emphasis being good stewards of what God has given to us. A steward is a person who cares for the interests of another in their absence. In the Garden, God gave Adam and Eve a job: to subdue and rule over all that God had created. This rulership is tied to being created in God's image. We are to be God's representatives here on earth, extending God's rule to all that God created. Jesus gives us the model to follow. He demonstrates perfect stewardship. The question remains whose example will you follow as you seek to live out God's intention for your life. Will you be an extension of God's rulership, or will you be an extension of how society around us seeks to rule?


In some ways, this also ties to what we are discussing in our adult class, as well. We are examining Jesus' parable of the Prodigal Son, or to be more accurate, two lost sons. Author and pastor Tim Keller talks about how each son demonstrates a way to find happiness and meaning in our lives. The first son seeks to find it through lavish spending and self-indulgence. The second son attempts to find happiness through moral conformity. The father in the story, who represents God, takes the initiative with each one extending to them his love and a place in the family. The parable emphasizes the condition of the two brothers' hearts. Both are far from the father. As the parable ends, only one heart has softened toward the father. The other remains distant and hard. The question becomes, what is the condition of your heart. Will you be an extension of God's rulership by pursing the kingdom of God, or will you seek power to extend rulership as the world sees it? If you want a taste of the adult study, you can find the videos for the Prodigal God study through our RightNow Media account.

On the family front, the kids found an item recently they would like to buy. So Emily and I decided they could do some extra work around the house to earn some money. So, one day, William kept asking what he could do, so we showed him how to dust the furniture in our living room. The next day, he wanted more chores, so we sent him outside to weed. He came in after weeding and asked if he could go dust the living room again. He was disappointed to find out that you don't typically dust a room every single day. This morning, he lamented to me that it will take him a long time to earn enough money, because there are not enough chores to do. I am certain that there are more than enough extra jobs around the house that he can help with.

Anyway, thank you for reading. I look forward to continuing our discipleship opportunities this year and hope that you and your family will find ways to grow in your faith individually and in community. UPC Shopper

With the financial challenges our mission partners will face in 2022, UPC Shopper makes more sense than ever. If you use UPC Shopper cards for your day-to-day purchases - groceries, prescriptions, gas, restaurants, etc., you can add to our missions without spending anything extra. The amount the mission makes from each purchase depends on the store's contribution. The discount percent that is provided to the mission ranges from 1.5% to 50% per card.

Here are some historical examples of how buying shopper cards helps our missions. One couple added more than \$180 from orders placed on-line. (That does not include the numerous times they just picked up a card or two from the Shopper Table.) One week in December 4 UPC members placed orders, presumably for Christmas, and increased the mission's balance by \$135. With around 20 families participating, UPC shopper took in over \$2500 in 2011. Think how much more income we could generate if the number of participating families increased to 40, 60 or even 80. With just 40 families participating, we could raise \$5000 without costing the participants anything. We would all like to give more to support mission work. This is a great no-cost way to do that. In this tough fiscal environment, where every penny counts, UPC shopper just makes good sense.

If you are unfamiliar with UPC shopper, stop by the table in the narthex just about any Sunday and ask Dian. She would be happy to explain the program to you.



October's joy-sharing is Feed My Starving Children

Feed My Starving Children (FMSC)

Feeding kids. Feeding spirits. Empowering communities. Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) believes hope starts with food. As a Christian nonprofit, FMSC is dedicated to seeing every child whole in body and spirit. FMSC meals are hand-packed by volunteers and sent to an incredible network of partner organizations that stay with communities for the long haul, empowering them to move from relief to development. In the 2021-2022 fiscal year, March 1, 2021- February 28, 2022, more than 477,486 volunteers came back to pack after Covid and provided enough meals to feed 1,091,787 for a year.
