Risk-Taking Mission and Service is a primary focus of the United Protestant Church. It is estimated that in 2023 our volunteers in service to the church and the mission fields have donated 10,000 hours of work on behalf of Jesus Christ! For a church of our size, that number is simply astounding! Hands on mission and service changes the lives of both the givers and receivers as "God strengthens the body of Christ through mission and service" (R. Schnase). Our volunteers, after spending time in worship and Bible study learning that Scripture inevitably links the love of God to love of our neighbors, have learned that serving Christ in this world takes a personal sacrifice of time, talent and labor.

In-house service at the UPC, among many activities, may consist of teaching Sunday School, serving on a committee, pulling weeds in a garden bed, driving someone to a doctor's appointment, washing windows, writing a cheerful note to a shut-in, being a greeter or usher during a worship service, singing in a choir, being a Nursery assistant, chaperoning a youth event, and participating in intercessory prayer. STEWARDSHIP TESTIMONIAL

Presented by Jerry Wessale on September 17th

When I was asked to give a testimonial to UPC, I had little hesitation and I soon consented. However, a couple of days later, I thought to myself "Oh my God, what have I done?" I felt like that man portrayed in the famous painting by Norwegian artist Edvard Munch, entitled "The Scream". It is a semi-abstract image of a man who appears to be in a state of utter fear and despair. That's a bit of an exaggeration, but I quickly overcame my trepidation.

My testimonial is a little different than those presented before. I became a member of UPC on March 24, 2019. In relative terms, I am a newbie. There is no doubt in my mind that being a part of this congregation has served as a super recharge, a realignment of my Christian faith and of my feelings towards my fellow man. This church – truly a church family -- demonstrates faith through action, a real trust in God, the power of prayer, compassion for our fellow man, extraordinary generosity, the expressing of gratitude, and the necessity of communal worship and fellowship. It makes lemonade out of lemons. I continue to be amazed by the loyalty and dedication shown by many of its long-time members. But before I expand on how the ministry of this church has impacted my faith, I need to explain some aspects of my faith journey, which at times has been a rocky one.

I am a true Midwestern boy. My mother's family was from Iowa (and Canada), and all of my father's European ancestors settled in or around a small town southwest of Minneapolis called Waconia. I have discovered that their denominational affiliations included Lutheran, German Baptist, Moravian, and Roman Catholic. I was born and raised in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and baptized and confirmed as a Presbyterian. My family were members of Westminster Presbyterian church.

First and foremost, I am a Christian and a husband. But I also consider myself a scientist. I am a very curious person. I believe that if one stops learning, you stop living. My training and my entire working career has been focused on biomedical research. It has always been very rewarding but challenging. As a scientist I was trained to think analytically and critically. Evidence-based reasoning was and is essential. Consequently, for years, I succumbed to an issue many scientists feel a need to resolve: the apparent conflict or dichotomy between religion (Christianity in particular) and science. After college, I stopped attending church services except for occasional attendance with my grandparents or a friend. Faith drift took over, or more like faith drought; the reservoir was drying up. I felt that I didn't need communal worship. There was even a time period where I questioned the divinity of Christ and the existence of God. However, I just barely remained grounded thanks to my relationships with three notable people. In retrospect, I now realize how incredibly blessed I have been to have had these people in my life.

First, there was my paternal grandfather, Grampa George Wessale, a deacon and an elder at Westminster for many years. He and I had a very special relationship. He was an electrical engineer educated at the University of Minnesota. I spent many summers fishing with him at their cottage in the northern part of the state. We had many serious discussions out there on Birch Lake. Moreover, he was persistent in encouraging me to attend graduate school.

And so I did. I ended up spending nearly 13 years at Purdue University, first as a graduate student, during which I received masters and Ph.D. degrees in pharmacology and physiology. That was followed by a post-doctoral fellowship, followed by an appointment on the research faculty. For the latter half of that period, my mentor and boss was a remarkable man, Leslie Geddes. He was the Showalter Distinguished Professor of Biomedical Engineering and the director of the Hillenbrand Biomedical Engineering Center, an interdisciplinary medical research group made up of biologists, physician/researchers, and engineers, and administered through the Schools of Engineering. It was one of the first centers to research development of an automatic, fully implantable, cardiac defibrillator as well as a portable external defibrillator usable in public settings. I was privileged to participate in some of that research. Geddes himself was a brilliant and innovative electrical engineer and physiologist. But most importantly, he was kind, very generous with his time and with sharing credit, an excellent listener, certainly not arrogant (given that he had every reason to be), humble (for a scientist, that is), and oh so charming. He ingrained in me that a commitment made is a commitment kept. He took in many students, engineers and biologists, under his wing, and I was fortunate to be one of those. I was never quite certain about his religious affiliations; he rarely spoke of that. Nevertheless, his actions suggested a belief in what Francis Collins has referred to as "moral" law. Despite my ongoing faith drift, and because of the influence of Leslie Geddes and my grandfather, I learned how to treat people with respect, patience, and compassion. Coincidences? I don't think so.

But above all else, the most important outcome from my time at West Lafayette, Indiana, was my meeting a lovely woman, who became my wife of over 38 years and still going. I like to say that we may not have it all together, but together we have it all. Our life together a coincidence? Absolutely not.

As I transitioned from full-time work into retirement, which by the way, was not an easy process for me, I had more time to consider as to how to reconcile my perceived contradictions between religion and science. I came to the realization that my waning faith was based more on ignorance than on knowledge. So I read several books on the subject, including Mere Christianity, by C.S. Lewis, and The Language of God, by Francis Collins. I always wanted to read the entire Bible on my own, but never "had the time," or so I thought. I now had the time. No excuses, so I took up the task. I was forewarned by a good friend and former colleague to NOT follow the traditional, published order of Scriptures. "You'll likely get bogged down by either Leviticus or Numbers, and quit. Start with the New Testament." So I did just that over a span of about 9 months. It was a transforming experience. I was reacquainted with our Helper/

Counselor, that is to say, the Holy Spirit. I relearned that all men are God's children. Perhaps most importantly, the Gospels and Pauline Epistles convinced me that communal worship and fellowship was essential for maintaining a loving and productive relationship with God. The Book of James became one of my favorites; I like to think of it as "Jim's practical guide to everyday Christian living."

After we moved to Grayslake in February of 1994, we were aware of UPC and did attend some services, but only sporadically. (By the way, don't ever try moving during the first week of February!). I realized that I needed to become a part of a church congregation, and subsequently I made a commitment to myself (not a bargain with God) that when I do join a church, I would become an active member.

In the movie version of Wizard of Oz, there is a scene where the heroine Dorothy is preparing to leave the Land of Oz and return to Kansas. The scarecrow asks her "What have you learned, Dorothy?" Part of her reply is "If I ever go looking for my heart's desire again, I won't look any further than my own back yard." Low and behold, UPC was very nearly in my own back yard. So, for this and far more important reasons, I became a member. Coincidence? Absolutely not.

Soon thereafter, I was approached to participate in a number of different activities. I became vice-chair of the Building and Operations Commission, working alongside the incredible Rick Burg, as well as a member of the Operations Committee. I joined the Home Team, helping to provide transportation for members to/from medical appointments and church services, and am now its "Chief", as my dear friend and team colleague, Kim Lenzen, likes to call me. Since the fall of 2019, I have volunteered in UPC's PADS program for the Lake County homeless (PADS being an acronym for Providing Advocacy, Dignity, and Shelter), a totally eye-opening, mind-expanding. compassion-elevating experience. Then there is Feed My Starving Children, I joined the Grace Notes, UPC's hand bell choir. I am also serving on the Adult Education committee. Ryan and Emily Aubrey have led a remarkable series of adult study groups; subjects have included the books of Nehemiah and James, and the character of God. We have just begun a study about the book of Hebrews. I attend a men's group that meets weekly. And lastly, as another way to serve the broader community, since 2020 I have been an unpaid volunteer tax-preparer for the AARP Tax Aide program, which provides free tax preparation for seniors and low-income families. I cannot put into words the satisfaction I receive from participating in these activities. Thank you UPC. You have changed my life for the better.

In closing, I strive to be an instrument of giving and blessings to other people, as I was blessed in so many ways by special people throughout my life – and am blessed by being a part this loving UPC congregation – all because of God's amazing grace and love for me. Through the remarkable fellowship and ministries of UPC, I am becoming "grounded in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, transformed by God."



PADS EMERGENCY SHELTER SITES WILL NOT OPEN FOR 2023-2024:

The month of September brought information that many new changes are being made in some of the PADS Lake County programs, among these is that PADS clients will be housed in hotels for this emergency shelter site season.

We've welcomed the new Executive Director, Allen Swilley, who has sent site leaders emails introducing himself and explaining the changes, reasons for them, and "what's next." A copy of this email with current detailed information sent by Executive Director Swilley is included in this UNIFIER for your information as part of our PADS faith community. This email has already been shared with the UPC Administrative Council and Membership Committee and with active UPC PADS Site volunteers.

Director Swilley has scheduled a meeting with site leaders on Thursday, September 28 at 6 PM to discuss ways in which the churches and volunteers will be needed to continue providing services and necessary assistance to those experiencing homelessness in Lake County. Information received on September 28 will be shared at the October meetings of the Ad Council and Mission Committee and with the congregation in Tuesday Newsday emails and the November UNIFIER.

PADS MISSION AT UPC IN COOPERATION WITH ST. GILBERT CHURCH:

People experiencing homelessness in Lake County continue to need our help. Our site will continue to deliver needed items to the main office using the PADS funds we have available to purchase clothing, food, gift cards, and other necessities as we have in the past. Our PADS leaders from UPC, St. Gilbert, and others intend to continue working together in whatever ways we can to serve in this common ministry. We plan for St. Gilbert students to continue donating food items which will be delivered by our food coordinators from St. Gilbert to the main office for hotel guests. Our clothing coordinator and I will continue to communicate regularly with PADS staff to be kept abreast of the needs of clients which require our assistance and will purchase/procure and deliver these items as needed.

Dear Faith Community Partners,

It is with full humility and a deep appreciation for your dedicated support to PADS that I draft this email. My name is Allen, and I am the new Executive Director at PADS Lake County. As valued partners in the fight to end homelessness I wanted to introduce myself and follow-up on phone calls and emails sent by my colleague, Eric Foote. For fifty years (50) our Faith community has answered the call as the backbone of support for addressing shelter needs in Lake County. For fifty years your relentless compassion and selfless volunteerism has ensured that our clients have a warm and safe place to be, especially in the winter months. For fifty years you have met our clients where they were, served them warm meals, and leaned into their experience with an empathetic ear. It is with this understanding that I know how potentially challenging and perplexing it was to hear that we were not going to re-start our rotating church program this year, so please allow me to give a little context.

Capacity and Operations Challenges

- We are serving more families than ever before. Of the 200 clients we currently have in our hotel shelter half are children. As an agency, we have decided that no matter what our funding challenges are, we will not allow children to go unsheltered.
- Prior to COVID there was a slow drip of decline in church participation that was then exacerbated by COVID. Over the last 12 months we have lost six church shelter sites who tried their best to pull together volunteers and make space for the shelter season but were unable to do so. We recognize this as a growing trend as our volunteer population ages and volunteer motivation shifts to identifying safer engagement opportunities due to COVID.
- While PADS undergoes a process of adjusting our internal systems and practices to serve more clients at our day site and funnel them into our hotel shelter, we weighed the operational and logistical challenge of supporting our church sites vs. expanding hotel sites where we can centralize operations and have better access to our clients to engage them in ongoing case management for the purpose of ending their homelessness.

What Happens Next?

- We have developed a new intake and assessment system that will allow us to serve more clients and assess their needs immediately as opposed to scheduling appointments for them to return later, allowing us to prioritize our clients' needs. Additionally, beginning the middle of October, we will have hours at our Day Resource Center that extend into the night hours (9pm) to accommodate any police drop-offs of individuals presenting with literal homelessness.
- We calculated the average nightly capacity of our church shelters to be approximately 50 beds. Because of recent and unexpected resources from the state, we can offer 40 additional rooms/80 additional beds, exceeding our church capacity by 30 beds. While we have added extra capacity, just like church shelter, we anticipate delicately managing this capacity and potentially not being able to meet everyone's shelter needs, but we recognize that this approach drastically reduces the need for an unpredictable lottery system.
- Our faith community is the life blood of our work, and we cannot effectively serve our clients without you. We intend to offer multiple volunteer opportunities that we believe will enhance our service delivery. These opportunities include daily warm meal deliveries to our hotel shelters, weekly food bags drop-offs to ensure our families do not go hungry in the interim, volunteer hours at our day site, and more. I would like to invite everyone to a virtual check-in meeting on **Thursday, September 28**th, **from 6pm to 7pm.** During this time, we will answer any questions you all may have to the best of our ability. Invitation to follow.

We at PADS immensely appreciate our partnership with our Faith community. Thank you for your continued and dedicated response to the call to serve our neighbors in need as we do all we can to cultivate an ecosystem of resources, systems, and opportunities for our clients to thrive in.

The cards with messages must be returned to UPC by October 23. Packets of 10 cards are available at the end of the Mission Table or from Rose Pech 847-682-2837. October 25 is our mailing deadline.

Companions Journeying Together sends Birthday, Mother's Day, Thinking of You and Christmas cards to prisoners and to some county jail inmates in Illinois.

This ministry, which Pat Curnow introduced to WCF many years ago, **has been adopted as a UPC churchwide mission**. Each card must be inside a plain envelope that is NOT sealed. You can donate blank cards or write notes in the provided Christmas cards. The cards are used in one of two ways:

- Signed cards are given to the inmates to encourage and cheer them--signed with first name only, including words of encouragement and UPC's name.
- Blank cards, unsigned cards or stationery are given to the inmates so that they can stay in touch with their families and/or friends.

Messages should be friendly, NOT "preachy." Sample messages to use as ideas are at the lower part of this page and can be signed using your first name only or by adding United Protestant Church.

- Crayons or markers cannot be used.
- Only PLAIN cards are allowed.
- Musical cards; cards that have multiple layers; and cards with glitter, tape, glued items, stickers, other substances or added decorations are NOT allowed.
- Each card must be inside a plain envelope that is NOT sealed.

Sample messages for writing Christmas cards to prison/jail inmates:

- Warmest thoughts are with you at this very special time of the year.
- The spirit of Christmas starts in the heart. We hope yours is filled with tinsel and bells, wherever the season might find you.
- It has to be hard to be away from your family and friends at this time of year. I want you to know you're in my thoughts.
- Thinking of you and wishing you nothing but goodness and joy in 2024.
- Sending Christmas wishes and peace for the New Year as I hold you in prayer.
- Holding you in my thoughts during the Christmas Season and wishing all good things for you in 2024.
- May the Spirit of Christmas be with you now and throughout the coming year.
- Wishing you the blessings of Christmas—Love, Joy, Peace, and Hope—now and throughout the year.
