I think most of us do not like confrontation. This is likely true to varying degrees, from those who avoid conflict at all costs to those who don't like it but are able to face it when needed. Very few of us, if any, crave conflict. But most confrontations we face in our life aren't explosive or major crises, but they are the small simple decisions and choices that we face every day. They are the times we don't turn a blind eye to a situation that we could side-step. We instead calmly address what is before us.

Take the example of Jesus in Samaria in John 4. Jesus is in Samaria because that is the shortest route between Galilee in the north and Judea in the south. He is sitting beside a well because he is thirsty and it is the middle of the day. Most of us will likely never be in a circumstance or situation where we are faced with a loud confrontation about racism or sexism. But all of us will face these everyday decisions. May we silently confront the wrongs of this world by the strength of the Holy Spirit in us.

Dear Church Family,

August has arrived, and with it come a lot of questions regarding the Fall and what things will continue to look like in our community and in our church. In the middle of July, which is when I am writing this, our Christian Education Committee met to discuss what our Fall educational ministries would look like. From this meeting, each individual education committee will meet to discuss specifics as it relates to their individual ministries. It is a hard time, and difficult to have any concrete plans, as things continue to change.

Currently, we are hoping to open our educational ministries at the beginning of October. Each of the committees will meet and discuss what ministry will look like in the coming year. We are working hard to figure out how to best serve you. I will share with you four points to keep in mind that I shared with our Christian Education Committee at our July meeting.

Effective Christian education does not take place in a vacuum. It is best accomplished in the context of loving relationships and effective worship.

What we do in Christian education, and all our Christian walk, is a partnership with God.

We teach Scripture in a way that calls for response.

The purpose of Christian education is a well-developed faith that has cognitive, affective, and volitional components.

These are important for us all to think through. They are all accurate of our Christian walk. So, some natural questions from these are: "How do we build loving relationships?", "Are we practicing effective worship, even outside of Sunday morning?", "How do we encourage and develop out partnership with God?", "Does Scripture call for a response in our lives?", if not, "How does our approach to Scripture need to be adjusted?", and finally, "How are my mind, heart, and way I live being renewed?". It is important that not only our committees and ministries ask these questions as we prepare for our ministry year. We as individuals need to constantly be evaluating our walk with Christ. Faith is not static. We are constantly moving in our faith. The question is what direction we are moving.

Thankfully, discipleship is not limited to our Sunday morning education hour or Sunday morning service. Things will look a little different over the course of the next year, but our goal and mission as Christian Education ministries is that we seek to build followers of Christ moving toward maturity. From September to about February, my Unifier articles discussed a framework to thinking about discipleship. It looked at how we move from being Curious to Consecrated. Following along that path is what becoming a mature follower of Christ is about. May we each continue to seek after God and grow in our faith, both individually and as a community.

UPC PADS UPDATE—OUTLOOK AS OF JULY 15, 2020

At this point, UPC PADS leaders aren't sure what our UPC PADS service model will look like for the coming PADS shelter season. Our UPC Leadership Team received an update from PADS Lake County during a ZOOM meeting on July 8 giving us new information. As of then, slightly more than 150 guests were still being housed and fed in hotels while they continued to receive PADS services in coordination with various housing agencies in Lake County. In addition, PADS has received enough funding to provide housing in 50 hotel rooms throughout the coming PAD Shelter Season, October 1, 2020, thru April 30, 2021. This means our 30th PADS Season could look very different for UPC! We don't yet know what that look will be.

There's a possibility we'll be asked, along with the other sites, to help at a fixed site in a different location by providing volunteers and food. This site would be needed primarily for walk-ins and police drop offs, so the number of guests would likely be small and would definitely vary each night. The schedule and tasks may also be slightly different. The manner of food delivery will be different regardless of where we serve it as we follow the regulations that are then in place.

Currently, plans are in process to help provide the same types of needed clothing as in the past. However, the main distribution will not be at UPC. Clothing will likely be distributed through the PADS office by case managers with the Shelter Project Director Nicole Harris and our clothing coordinator Mary Zorc working out those details. FYI: Last season we distributed clothing valued at \$8000 to needy PADS guests. Many of these items were donations of newly purchased clothing we received from very generous volunteers who "hit the sales" before and throughout the season, enabling us to provide this service.

Regardless of what the "picture" looks like, **WE WILL DEFINITELY NEED VOLUNTEERS! WE WILL NEED A VOLUNTEER COORDINATOR! WE WILL NEED DONATIONS!! WE WILL CONTINUE TO NEED YOUR SUPPORT!!**

Our next PADS ZOOM meeting is scheduled for August 12. We will give an update in the Tuesday Newsday email after that meeting, and our September UNIFIER article will give you any new information. Another ZOOM meeting is scheduled for September 9, and we will provide these and other updates as they are received.

At this point, we want to continue providing help for the guests who are in hotels. The greatest needs are pop-top canned meal items (Chef Boyardee, Dinty Moore meals, chili, chunky soup), Easy Mac, Cup-o-Soup, granola bars, individual bags of chips, pop tarts, oatmeal packets, peanut butter, and individual fruit cups/applesauce. Gift cards to McDonalds (\$10) and to Walmart (\$25) are still welcomed.
